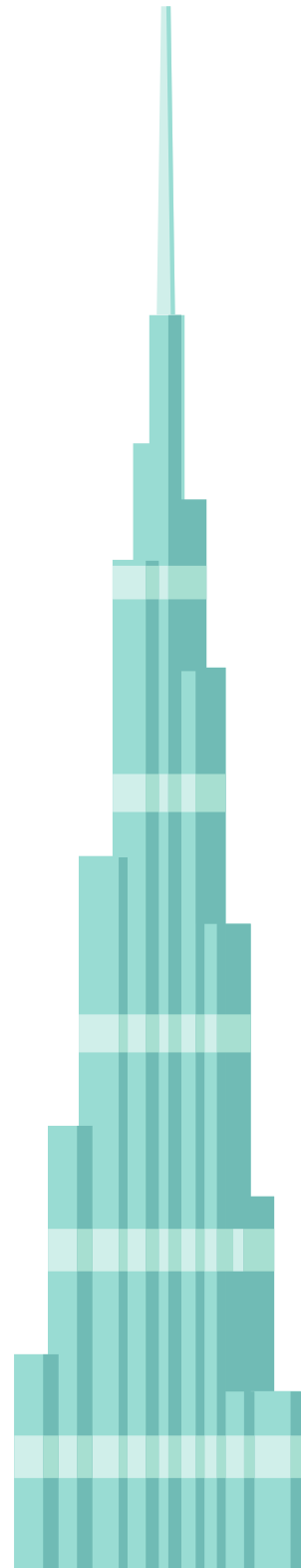
Work Visa Reality

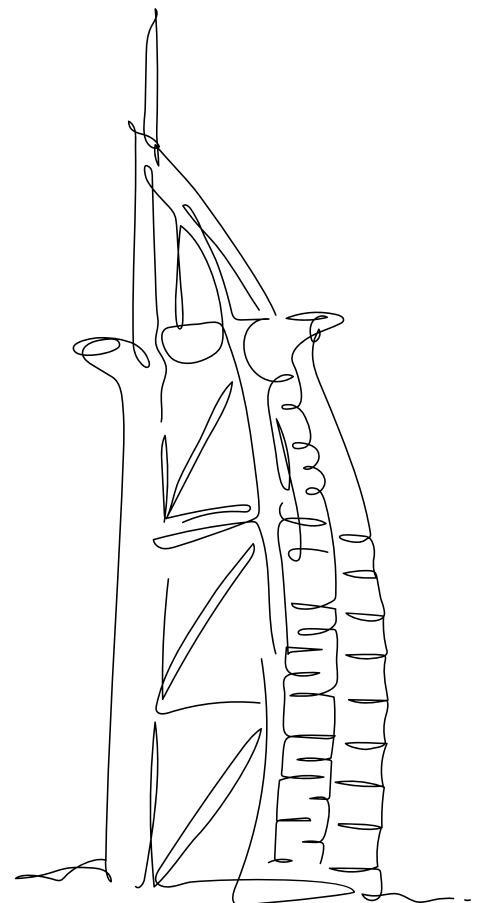
