The Role of the Graduate Route Visa

The UK allows students to stay for:

- 2 years after graduation (3 years for PhD)

Guaranteed employment
Automatic job placement

—not just the university.

Strong course + strong university
Industry-aligned skills
Early preparation

When It Doesn't

Poor course selection
No job strategy
Unrealistic expectations

Students with strong academic backgrounds
Students with relevant skills
Students willing to work hard
Students who plan early

Who May Struggle

Students relying only on the degree
Students without career clarity
Students expecting easy outcomes

UK vs Other Countries (Career Perspective)

UK vs Germany

- UK: broader job market, competitive
- Germany: stronger for technical roles

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UK vs Canada

- UK: faster degree
- Canada: more structured immigration
